## Results - Rookie Roundup - April 2012 (SSB)

I am a brand new ham (first licensed 2/23/2012) and was introduced to this contest by my Elmer. I was not sure if I would like contesting and wanted to slide into it slowly. I got a lot more than I expected. The Rookie Round Up was a great introductory contest for me to enter and I will be bringing up this contest to my club to try to get the rest of them behind it. -- KB1WTI (See all of Jeff's comments in the Soapbox section of this writeup.)

A third year of the ARRL's <u>Rookie Roundup</u> has begun with the April SSB contest. As the old TV show theme sang, "Californy is the place ya wanna be..." as there was a baker's dozen of entries from the Golden State. We saw lots more activity from the 8<sup>th</sup> district, too, and every one of the call areas was represented.

Along with dropping 6 meters from the contest, two major rule changes were in effect with this running of the contest; multioperator entries and team competition. Clubs had requested a multioperator category to maximize the number of Rookies that could use a club station and team competition has proved popular in other contests – why not in Rookie Roundup?

There was a bit of confusion about call signs and identification for some of the stations. A Technician call sign cannot be used on the HF phone bands (other than 10 meters) without adding the control operator's call. For example, a Technician such as KE7VDA working 20 meter phone at her station with control operator K6UFO would have to sign KE7VDA/K6UFO to show that the control operator is authorized for those frequencies, or simply use the control operator's call sign. (See FCC §97.119) For non-Rookie operators, should you encounter an operator identifying with a call sign not authorized for that frequency, politely inform them of the problem, make sure there isn't some mistake, and then suggest the correct procedure as you would like to be informed of a problem with your operating – no need to get upset as we all make mistakes.

We had quite a few "repeat Rookies" show up again in the results this year – welcome back!

5<sup>th</sup> district: NN5AA (district winner, 4<sup>th</sup> place last April)
7<sup>th</sup> district: KF7KCF (district winner, 2<sup>nd</sup> place last April)

In the  $4^{th}$  district, it was a close race between Scott, KK4ECR and KK4DZP for  $3^{rd}$  and  $4^{th}$ .

As this was the first Rookie Roundup with a Multioperator category – we're putting the scores right up front. The top score – unlike the Single Operator category – came from the middle of the country and how appropriate is it that the Roundup's highest multiop score came from Texas? A very nice job by the K5KRE group of operators to set the standard high for upcoming contests.

If you've enjoyed the Rookie Roundup, check out August's North American QSO Party contests . (<a href="www.ncjweb.com">www.ncjweb.com</a>) The popular NAQP events last for 12-hours (you can operate for 10 out of the 12 hours) on Saturday. The CW contest is on Aug 4<sup>th</sup> and the Phone contest on Aug 18<sup>th</sup>. Power is restricted to 100 watts output – so everyone is "barefoot". The exchange is your name and state/province/DXCC entity and you can work stations on all six HF bands: 160, 80, 40, 20, 15, and 10 meters. It's a GREAT way to work on your Five-Band Worked All States (5BWAS) award. (<a href="www.arrl.org/was">www.arrl.org/was</a>)

The biggest summertime HF of the year is coming up, too – the IARU HF Championship. All of the HF bands and both CW and SSB QSOs will be busy with stations from all over the world! You'll find a
